Lundby's 60 Years of Success A Big Party in a Small World

HISTORY OF LUNDBY OF SWEDEN Part VI

Sixth Ten Years—1997-2007

 $E^{VERY\ YEAR\ SINCE\ 1947}$ has been filled with exciting developments for Lundby. And the success story continues into 2007, the 60^{th} year of Lundby of Sweden dollhouses. At the age of 60, Lundby is truly a celebrity.


In 1997, Micki Leksaker A/B, an early competitor of Lundby, purchased the rights to produce the Lundby Gothenburg dollhouse, furniture and accessories. Two years later in 1999, Micki introduced a fresh, exciting line of Lundby, including the Gothenburg dollhouse and a complete line of furniture. In 2005, Micki employed architects to design the first new Lundby dollhouse in 15 years and named it the "New 2005 Stockholm." In 2006 the firm kept the original 1960s asymmetrical design of the Gothenburg dollhouse, but renamed it the Småland.

Micki Leksaker, founded in 1944, is located deep in the woods of Småland in Gemla, Sweden. The firm, owned by the Aronsson family, now has 55 employees and is known all around the world for delightful, fine quality toys. In a recent promotional piece, Micki describes their Lundby dollhouse as a "real global celebrity." The advertisement goes on to say, "Lundby—the Swedish doll's house for both mummy and grandma alike." Truer words were never spoken!

Furthermore, Micki pledges to keep up with developments in the fields of fashion, form, and design, which signifies a continuous story for Lundby dollhouses. Micki Leksaker, the Swedish Toy Factory, plans to go on living "happily ever after—forever!"

To view Micki's new Lundby line, however, we need only wait until after the 59th Spielwarenmesse International Toy Fair in Nuremberg, Germany, from February 7-12, 2008! For more information, go to www.spielwarenmesse.de/index.php?id=4&L=1.

The Lundby/Caroline's Home silver Christmas tree represents Catherine Browne's memories of childhood. Catherine loves this miniature tree because she remembers that her Nanna had a full-sized silver tree just like it during the 1970s.

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PLEASE READ GAREFULLY this correction to the article on transformers in the September 2007 issue. The sentence in the third paragraph, "When the Micki Toy Company introduced a new series of dollhouses and transformers in 1999, collectors soon discovered that the new transformer would not electrify Lundby houses manufactured prior to 1999," is incorrect. Patricia Harrington has done additional research and has found the transformers ARE usable with almost all Lundby dollhouses manufactured prior to 1999, as well as post-1999 Lundby dollhouses. Please read further.

Great News about Lighting Up the North American Lundby World!

EVERYONE REMEMBERS the thrill of lighting a Lundby dollhouse for the first time. Now Cheeky Monkey Toys is making that reality much more available for collectors in the US and Canada by offering an imported transformer for North America that works in ALL Lundby dollhouses from 1974 through the current year.

Lundby has never manufactured its own transformers. The same Danish company that makes the post-1999 transformer for Lundby is also making the North American transformer for Cheeky Monkey Toys. Even though they cannot put a Lundby label on it, the specifications for the transformers are identical. Patricia has attempted to get the Danish company to manufacture the old-type Lundby transformer, but has not been successful. As a result, she has tested the current transformer and has made it hook up successfully.

While the prongs on the new plugs are a little longer than the original ones for

the older houses, they will stay plugged in and they will work. A tip from Elisabeth Lantz in Sweden: "Use a tiny bit, about the size of a grain of rice, of "sticky-tack" to hold them in place."

If you do not know for sure the dates on your dollhouse, the transformer will work on houses from the mid-1970s on, which have plastic front frames. The transformers in stock will NOT work directly connected to older wood-framed houses where the transformer holes are 1 inch or 12mm apart.

More good news! Patricia has volunteered to write more about connecting the new Cheeky Monkey transformers to old wood-framed dollhouses in upcoming issues of *The Lundby Letter*. Stay plugged in!

He has made it exactly to the measures of the original one.

When Paige purchased one of Lee's diving boards to replace her lost one, she thought it was such a fine reproduction that she decided to buy 12 more. That purchase brought to mind a charitable project she wants to share with her fellow members.

Since Lise Jensen, Paige's collector friend and member of the WLLC, died of

cancer in 2006, it is Paige's plan to sell each diving board for \$10, plus the additional postage costs. Paige will then contribute the proceeds to cancer research in honor of Lise. Lee is also wholeheartedly supporting this project because he is a cancer survivor himself.

OR THOSE OF US LIVING IN THE NORTHERN HEMISPHERE, Christmas is a $oldsymbol{\Gamma}$ time for short days, long nights, snow and cold. Imagine celebrating Christmas in Australia where it's usually 40 degrees C (about 95 degrees F). Catherine Browne and her family adjust very well and love Christmas just as much as those who live near the traditional North Pole.

Christmas morning, which starts with the children opening Santa's presents, includes a rule in the family that the children love—they are not allowed to eat a proper breakfast on Christmas Day. They must eat "lollies," dips, chips, nuts, chocolate (same goes for Easter). The whole family has a "huge" three-course hot roast dinner for lunch after which the adults sleep all afternoon and the kids play.

Catherine's family consists of husband Michael, Megan 17 years, Gemma 14 years and James 3 years, plus one dog Emily the Corgi. The family enjoys 4-wheel driving in their Jeep and camping; they love going to swap meets and looking for old bits and pieces and traveling.

Catherine likes Lundby because the pieces are a good representation of homes and furnishings today. She comments that, because of Lundby's influence, in years to come people will be able to look back and

imagine what we had in our homes. Otherwise, they might think we all lived in the Victorian era!
